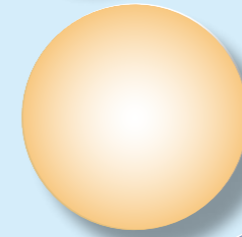

SPEAKERS



Professor Michael Stacey

Professor Michael Stacey is Professor of Surgery in the School of Surgery and Pathology at the University of Western Australia. He is a vascular surgeon and is based at Fremantle Hospital. Michael has a long standing research interest in wound healing and venous ulceration. His research group conducts research ranging from laboratory evaluations of the mechanisms for delayed healing in chronic wounds through to the clinical evaluation of new therapies.

Michael has been actively involved in national and international wound-healing societies, and was the founding president of the Australian Wound Management Association and the inaugural chair of the World Union of Wound Healing Societies. He is also a member of the International Wound Bed Preparation Advisory Board.



Dr Annabelle Duncan

Dr Annabelle Duncan holds a BSc., a Postgraduate Diploma of Science and an MSc from Otago University, a PhD from LaTrobe University and a DSc from Murdoch University. She worked as a research scientist at Otago University, Monash University and CSIRO before moving into science management.

Annabelle acts as an adviser to the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. She represents Australia at international meetings on biological-weapons control and has served as a biological-weapons inspector with the United Nations in Iraq. She was awarded a Public Service Medal in 1996 and an honorary DSc from Murdoch University in 2005 for her work in arms control. She is currently Deputy Director and Chief Operating Officer of the Bio21 Molecular Science and Biotechnology Institute at the University of Melbourne.



Associate Professor Keryln Carville

Associate Professor Keryln Carville has an extensive clinical practice in wound and ostomy management and an ongoing commitment to research and education, which she pursues via her joint roles in the Silver Chair Nursing Association and at Curtin University of Technology, where she is an Associate Professor responsible for the development and coordination of postgraduate programs in domiciliary nursing.

Keryln is a founding and life member and a current committee member of the Western Australia Wound Care Association. She is Chairperson of the Australian Wound Management Association Subcommittee for the development and review of Australian Standards of Wound Management. Keryln is the Chairperson of the Governance Committee for the newly formed Australian Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel (UPUAP). She also sits on the editorial board for Primary Intention and the Journal of Stomal Therapy Australia.



Greg Duncan

Master of Public Health majoring in epidemiology and evidence-based medicine and its influence on the practice of wound management. Greg lectures in wound care to registered nurses and medical students and he is a clinical advisor to two wound clinics. At a ministerial level, Greg is involved in the development of health policy for wound management. He has conducted highly evaluated wound management symposia for nurses.
